OBJECTIVE	
<p>Fluency in reading Ancient Greek; assimilation of the final elements of the language morphology (Optative, Perfect, Periphrastic tenses); ability to understand directly, without translation, more Koine Greek texts (most texts of the Septuagint); development of thematic vocabulary; and active assimilation of 2,500 words.</p>

MODE OF ASSESSMENT	
<p>Three quizzes during the semester (60%) and final exam on the texts studied during the semester (40%).</p> <p>The students will prepare two books out of the following list during the semester (or equivalent with the consent of the instructor):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -Gospel of John -Gospel of Mark -Book of Tobias -Book of Jonah -Book of Esther <p>The final exam will consist of a Greek paraphrase of a given passage selected by the instructor within the books studied by the student.</p>	

PROGRAM

Optative: morphology (-ίην, -οιμι, -αμι) and syntax (independent clauses)
ἤδη, ἔτι, οὕπω, οὐκέτι
Perfect tense: reduplication, Regular verbs, Grassmann law, contract verbs, ηκα ending, augment, two consonant starting stems and ρ- stems
Optative: morphology -ίμην ending
Syntax : potentialis
Perfect: labial, dental and velar stems, Liquid stems (-ν-, -λ-), Infinitive
